CONFLAGRATION STILL RAGES; NEW YORK BURNS

The fire that began two days ago in New York's Lower Manhattan still burns and severe cold weather continues to hamper firefighters efforts to halt the blaze. As reported yesterday much of Wall St, including the New York Stock Exchange, is now gone.

Yesterday saw the naval Marines called in to use gunpowder to destroy buildings in the path of the fire. So far only two deaths have been reported. Investigations into the cause of the blaze are continuing.
